MITI urges engagements with members of academia

Challenges in global economic environment warrants deeper collaboration, says MITI Secretary-General

THE Ministry of International Trade and Industry (MITI) is seeking more engagements with members of academia to enrich the curriculum which in turn will benefit the government, academe, students and the business community.

MITI Secretary-General Datuk Dr Rebecca Fatima Sta Maria said the ministry is conscious of the need to consult with industry, research institutions and experts in the respective fields.

"Public consultation and engagement is integral to our tasks at MITI and our doors are always open. We welcome feedback," she said in her opening speech at the "Succeeding in a Global Landscape of Accelerating Change for Emerging Business" forum in Kuala Lumpur yesterday.

The ministry has a cross-fertilisation programme with Malaysian International Chamber of Commerce and Industry (MICCI) and Federation of Malaysian Manufacturers (FMM), she added.

She said the challenges in the global economic environment warrants the deeper collaboration between the academic and business worlds, emphasising a broad sense to encompass economic and market analysts.

"We are very well aware of the pressures that impact our business community and the decisions it makes in the global arena, whether in Asean, AsiaCHA AND CHAL DFFICIA de Ce

Pacific Economic Cooperation or the World Trade Organisation as well as in domestic policy formulation which will impact business.

"In this context, we would be pleased to collaborate with members of academia in enriching the curriculum to the benefit of government, academe, students and the business community," she said

Dr Sta Maria said similar offers have also been made to members of the media. She welcomes the research that would assist in policy development.

MICCI executive director Steward Forbes emphasised there was "an absolute need" for businesses to have sustainable growth.

"There is a need for radical

change and commitment to holistic fundamental structural change, and the challenge of global impediments is real, particularly the competitive environment meaning that old formulas for trade and investment inducement will no longer be good enough," he said.

"In the case of Malaysia there are a number of factors that define our unique approach and differentiate our experience from those of others and which if not addressed can undermine or even derail the positive work being carried out, of these, I believe one of the most insidious is complacency," he said at the same event.

He said it is a major challenge for the government to address, on how to balance necessary affirmative action with the stimulus needed to strengthen themselves to compete in the open market.

"For the private sector, understand the importance of the public sector input in creating the 'right' environment while for the public sector, foster public/private partnerships by embracing confidence and trust in the private sector in a transparent manner," he added.

The seminar, to be led by former lead economist from World Bank professor Govindan Nair, brought together practitioners, industry experts, public sectors and academics to explore in-depth issues and opportunities within the emerging markets and to become dynamic global players.

FOUR hundred and fifty eight homeless people have registered at Anjung Singgah until February, Women, Family and Community Development Deputy Minister Heng Seai Kie said. "Due to its effectiveness, Prime Minister Datuk Seri Mohd Najib Razak when tabling the Budget 2012, had announced the expansion of Anjung Singgah to Johor, Penang and Sarawak," she said when answering a question from Senator Datuk Mohammed Najeeb Abdullah at Dewan Negara in Kuala Lumpur yesterday. Heng said the Community Development Department and ministry viewed the issue seriously by carrying out rescue operations periodically nationwide based on allocations under Section 3 of the Poor Persons Act 1977. — Bernama

Committee needed to monitor halal certified medicines

A SPECIAL steering and implementing committee should be set up to ensure that halal certified medicines are prescribed to Muslims in the country, said academician. Universiti Sains Malaysia dean of the School of Pharmaceutical Sciences Prof Dr Syed Azhar Syed Sulaiman said the committee could ensure that the pharmaceutical industry in the country would be transparent and committed in responding to the needs of Muslim consumers who were sensitive over halal issue. He said the committee could work closely with monitoring agencies such as the Islamic Development Department in finding ways to resolve the halal issue in the pharmaceutical industry. "We should be ashamed of ourselves as the halal pharmaceutical industry in the country is still lagging behind that of non-Islamic countries like Thailand and Belgium," he said. — Bernama

reinvestments from Japan

NAGOYA • The Northern Corridor Implementation Authority (NCIA) has secured two committed reinvestments during the two-day trade and investment mission to Kyoto and Nagoya, Japan.

Its chief executive, Datuk Redza Rafiq, said one of the deals would be signed between Aichi-based MRT Japan Co Ltd and Malaysian company, JPB Asia Pacific, in July in Kagoshima.

Later, a joint venture (JV) company would be set up to facilitate its operation in Malaysia, he said. MRT Japan, which is involved in marketing fruits, vegetables and horticulture, had invested RM35 million in two green cultivation houses of rock melons, chillies and Japanese pumpkins in Kuala Kura (Kedah) and Ara Kuda (Penang).

Redza said the company would invest another RM100 million to cater to strong demand for its products, especially from the Japanese, globally.

"The investment will be spread over three years and the project will be developed with local partners," he told

Malaysian reporters after a seminar on "Business Opportunities in Malaysia", held in conjunction with the mission.

The mission, from April 23-24, was led by Deputy Minister of International Trade and Investment, Datuk Mukhriz Mahathir.

Redza said the production expansion was expected to create 250 jobs and 100 business opportunities.

'Using the best technology from France and Japan's knowhow, the cultivation of greenhouse projects could generate a potential income of RM5,000 for the locals involved," he said.

Meanwhile, Global Outreach Energy Sdn Bhd and its Japanese partner, Useful Person Co Ltd, would invest an additional RM107 million to expand the light-emitting diode (LED) facility by 20,000 sq ft-30,000 sq ft facility from the current 8,000 sq ft.

The LED lighting products produced in Penang will soon be exported to the Philippines, Thailand and India. Currently, they are only exported to Japan. — Bernama

Canon targets RM3m sales from showcase
